

He got up, abandoned her, and drove to Medford for a close-up look at the Medford Hotel fire. He said he remembered talking with somebody at the fire. The next day he got phone calls from his law school friends who were living in Portland. "They told me there were all these quotations by me on page one of the Oregonian. Apparently that guy was a reporter. Well, that is my claim to fame," he said laughing.

What about his new bride? "She was furious. She found her own way home. We still have issues."

Bob has nevertheless been married for 31 years and has three children, age 30, 29, and 26, all of whom are happy and have great careers helping others in medicine and education. "They get that do-gooder compassion from their mother," he said.

We asked if he still played golf. "Well, I compete in golf. I play in tournaments and money games. I don't play for fun, except that for me, competition is fun."




Wear Your Badge — and Protect Your Badge
